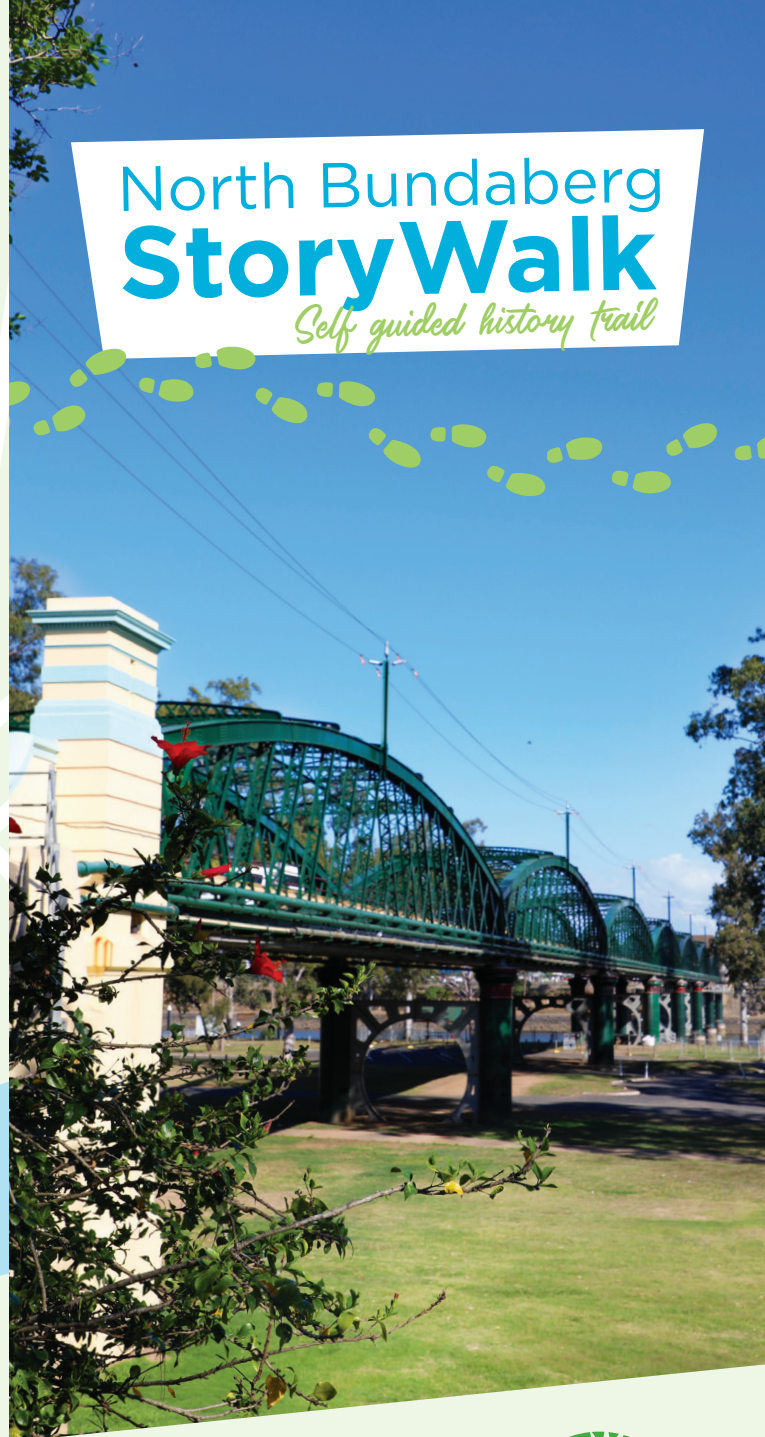
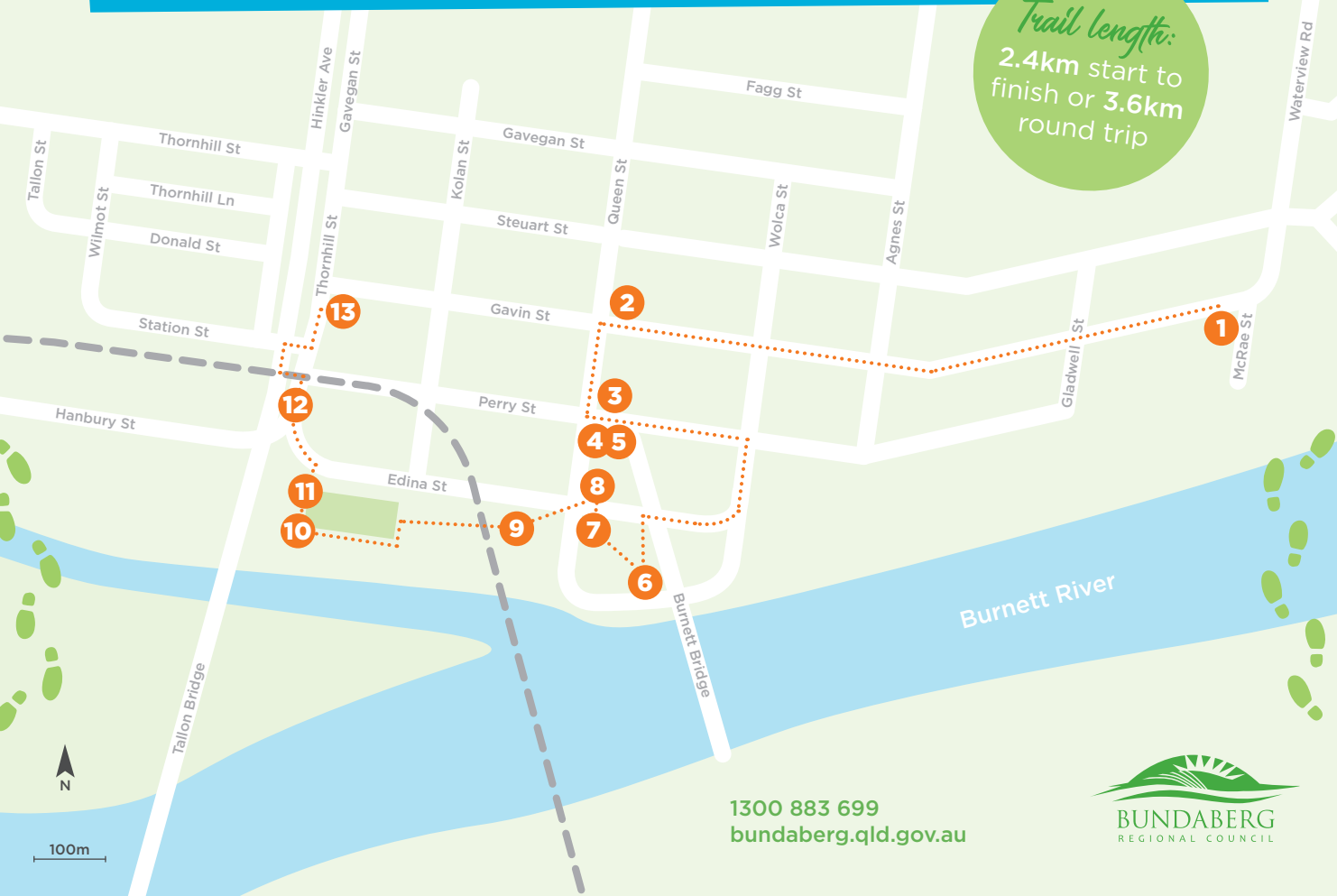

The North Bundaberg StoryWalk is a locative storytelling and local history project. North Bundaberg's history and its residents' memories have been captured and preserved as short, digital narratives that can be enjoyed in situ throughout the suburb as a walking trail or as individual stories.

Each marker on the map indicates the location of a QR or 'Quick Response' code that connects the digitised story with the physical location it features. QR codes are unique barcodes that can be read with free software called QR Readers. QR Readers can be downloaded onto your smartphone or Ipad through the App store or Google Play. Use your smartphone camera to view the QR code, scan the code to view and listen to the StoryWalk stories.

Now, put on your walking shoes, grab your device and use the map to discover North Bundaberg's history.



The Foundry (now Bundaberg Walkers) has been a Bundaberg institution for more than 100 years, surviving fire and flood. Find out more on the storyboard attached to the Bundaberg Walkers entrance sign.



Lex Rowland, a prominent Bundaberg local, shares some tales and fond memories of Francis Hinkler, aviator Bert Hinkler's mother. Find out more on the storyboard sign on the fence at Northside Produce, where the Hinkler family home once stood.



This grand old building has had a stately presence in North Bundaberg since 1885. Find the story of the Young Australian Hotel on the storyboard sign right by the front entrance of the Young Australian Hotel.



These prestigious department stores were founded in North Bundaberg in the late 1800's. Find the story about the Black brothers and their enterprise on the guard rail in the park beside Harry's Mowers.



The heritage listed 'Old Bridge' is a Bundaberg icon and is the only bridge of its kind in Queensland today. Find the story of the 'Old Bridge' on the guard rail in the park beside Harry's Mowers.



Ron Douglas reflects on time spent by the river as a boy and the passing down of culture from father to son. Find Ron's story on the back of the Lion's Park entrance sign by the river.



A public art project that gave colour to Lion's Park in North Bundaberg. Find the storyboard sign about the project and the artists involved on the bow of the ship in the Lions Park playground.



The famous aviator, Bundaberg boy Bert Hinkler, returns to his hometown. Find the storyboard sign on the guard rail behind Harry's Mowers leading down into the riverside parklands, and listen to the story about Bert and the stunning aero acrobatics he performed on arrival into Bundaberg.



Uncle Eddie Terrare provides an insight into traditions, culture and the Gehgeh found by the Burnett River. Find the storyboard sign post spike by the footpath before heading under the Railway Bridge.



Chinese settlers once cultivated prosperous market gardens along the Burnett river banks. Find the storyboard sign on the western side of the Off-Leash Dog Area in the Edina Street Parklands, and listen to the story of the region's early market gardeners.



This bridge was named after a local Bundaberg family who were devoted to sport in the region. Find the sign on the western side of the Off-Leash Dog area in the Edina Street Parklands, and listen to the story of how this bridge gave Bundaberg a second thoroughfare over the Burnett River.



Henry Ford was Bundaberg's first storekeeper and built his business here in North Bundaberg. Find out more on the storyboard sign post at the intersection of Edina and Hanbury Streets near the Tallon Bridge.



An edible, community garden on the corner of Gavin Street and Hinkler Avenue in North Bundaberg. Find the storyboard sign on the entrance to learn how the community garden started as an idea and grew into a garden for all to enjoy. Open the gate and step inside, everyone is welcome.
